Sign-up table: 2 for 2, Meals on Wheels for April (4 slots left), Mardi Gras volunteer hours, proposed Kiwanis International amendment (a \$30 dues increase), Chamber Expo on April 27, DeKalb Public Library book sale (work days April 19-24).

Gov Elect Tom Willis talked to us about the proposed KI "dues adjustment" which would raise the total dues per person to \$82. According to KI, without the increase, Kiwanis would have only 3 to 5 years left. The pandemic and ensuing stock market decrease has forced KI to dip deep into their reserves (including principal). The print version of the magazine is going away, but it will be available online. Staff is being reduced. Some people are returning on a contract basis, which means the same work, but no benefits. Tom blames KI for not keeping up with dues over the past years, arguing that small incremental increases would have caused less pain.

Community Services has started some work on getting **CPR training** for Kiwanians at Opportunity House. Probably sometime this summer or fall. Details still being worked out on costs, etc.

Rhodalyne Gallo-Crail (Tagalog instructor at NIU) and four of the program's Adult Leaders were to have joined us to talk about the Philippine Youth Leadership Program (PYLP). Alas, they were a little late, so Prez Mary filled in for a bit. The Program brings Filipinos (4 leaders, about 20 young students) to the US for leadership training. They spend time here at NIU with local families (Mary has been a host family, and will be again), and a week in Washington D.C. In the Philippines, the minority groups have been displaced, leading to various insurgencies. The Philippines has a diverse faith population, creating a lot of potential for conflict, and the hope is that this program provide community building skills for the students to help them help the Philippines navigate such troubles. Our Filipino guests come from Mindanao and comprise a doctor, 2 professors, and a development worker, and were very pleased to see some snow for the first time in their lives. The PYLP is one of hundreds of programs supported by the Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs of the US State Department, and has been operating at NIU for the last 20 years. Rhodalyne pointed out that it is cheaper to build diplomatic relationships than confrontational ones (the Department of Defense's budget is about 10 times that of State's). The program stresses cultural activities, appreciation of democratic values (especially freedom of speech and religion), and leadership skills. The 24 participants this year were selected from over 200 applicants.
