Ken Doubler reported that the next Beanzie Committee meeting — scheduled for Sunday, March 2 at Rosita's — has been cancelled. No new date has been set vet.

Shadow Gentry announced the Meals on Wheels Volunteer Appreciation event. set for Friday, March 14, from 4:00 until 6:00 PM at Salem Lutheran Church in Sycamore. All who've delivered meals this past year are invited.

Toney Xidis encouraged us, one final time, to buy tickets for next week's Mardi Gras festivity at Faranda's, and to invite friends and neighbors as well. He'd like volunteers to help decorate the hall next Tuesday, from 9:00 AM until noon or 1:00 until 3:00 PM.

Thirty-five tickets have been sold so far. Mardi Gras. We now have a card reader, so, yes, we're able to buy tickets (and pay Kiwanis dues as well) via credit card.

Sue Doubler asked us to bring any unused gift cards Tuesday evening; these will be collected and hopefully bid on at our silent auction.

Bob Hoffman has sign-up sheets now to recruit greeters, provide rides to members who may not be able to drive, and pass the microphone around during our weekly meetings.

<u>Program</u>

John Rey introduced Nathan Schwartz today — DeKalb County's chief engineer — responsible for maintaining and improving all of our county roads and bridges. All of the roads he looks after are blacktop; those not able to bear heavy loads and some of our rural roads are actually repaired by township crews.

At this time of year, county workers have to look out for potholes and cracks created by heavy trucks on thawing roads. Over the last few years, the county has gradually been upgrading roads so that they can safely bear up to 80,000

pounds. That's been the state standard since 1999, but outside of Chicago, few counties have yet reached that goal.

Upgrades continue, generally in segments of about six miles at a time.

Mr. Schwartz works very hard to acquire state and federal grants, since local property taxes alone can't meet repair costs. As the county's budget is divided now, the average homeowner pays about enough to pave two feet and nine inches of roadway per year.

Mr. Schwartz encouraged all who are interested to review the budget, and look over plans for new roads. These are posted on the county website.

Further discussion focused on particular roads and intersections, extending bike paths, and improving traffic safety. Schwartz cited one major success: since improvements have been made where Peace Road meets Route 64, collisions have dropped by more than 90%.

Plank Road continues to be a worry for many, and Schwartz outlined plans for major changes ahead. Most of the fatalities, he reports, are not along winding turns, but on the straightaways where impatient drivers try to pass by zipping into the oncoming lane.

Schwartz made it clear that our Highway Department scrapes by on a fixed income, so major projects are sometimes delayed until enough money has been saved up. Rebuilding Plank Road is the county's next major priority.
